His other responsibilites — work and family — hinder Iqbal in attending class daily, yet he works relentlessly to improve his studies and thus his quality of life. It is beautiful to see the effect their success has had on the girls currently attending GNFS.

The addition of music into GNFS and pre-primary curriculum has received surprising approval as well. Taught by the Shubendra & Saskia Rao Foundation, we must also thank Ms. Zuleikha and Shabda Kahn and his group for their endless support.

The addition of another slum enroute to Mobile Medical Unit is a great success we are joyful to share with you. The community of Seemapuri made multiple requests with the Hope Project as their need for any kind of medical care was overwhelming. Visitors of the MMU now receive standard care, and possibly lifesaving information on preventive measures. Currently serving about 50,000 people in 5 communities, it is our hope that every time a community is linked to government health facilities, the MMU can move on to another urban area left untreated.

With the formation of a new government, the country is looking forward to a fundamental approach on development. Recognizing and emphasizing social and economic issues, the newly elected party has raised the hopes and expectations of youths throughout society – including our local ones right here. Let us pray together that these hopes and expectations find their relief in reality.

My name is Lydia and I come from Germany. My motivationto come abroad was founded in a general dissatisfaction about the system of the western countries. I wanted to do something practical by myself, help with my own hands and spirit and in addition I wanted to see a part from the world that is different from mine. I did not guess how different it would be. For one year I had been volunteering and living in the Hope Project sharing love, affection, laughter, tears, problems and happiness with so many people coming to and working in the Project. This year changed my life in many ways. I had to adjust in a completely different cultural context without losing myself. That was not always easy. For me it took a long time to finally arrive with all my heart and soul in India but still the whole time was immensely enriching for me and this lasts until today. In the beginning the language barrier seemed to be unbelievably high. I only knew a little Hindi and listening to this complex and fast language made me desperate more than once. In the project itself the main language spoken is Hindi/Urdu so with other volunteers I quickly started to take Hindi classes. The longer we stayed the more we could express in this beautiful language. Moving in with a family in the Basti had another positive influence on my Hindi skills. Furthermore, the family became as close as my own family and we shared our lives in a wonderful way respect, acceptance, love, understanding, sharing and caring from both sides. In this place I want to say a big thank you to Tasveer and her whole family. This experience gave me another view on India and its affectionate people.

In the project itself I worked in different departments. Most of the time I spent in the Health Center. I learned a lot about the Indian understanding of health care. It is quite different from Germany. Comparatively, it is less hygienic but more hearty which I actually prefer. Endless conversations broadened my horizon and both staff members and I learned a lot about cultural differences and different point of views.

Interaction with the patients and beneficiaries was a daily joy and gave me a glimpse of how poor people can be. In Germany I had never seen poverty in that extent. It made me think again about all the things that we consider to be necessary in the west. In reality we need nothing more than trust in life and God. That is what I also learned.

In the support classes I gave English lessons as well as in the GNFS where I additionally gave music lessons from time to time. Highlight was our singing performance on Urs which made all of the little artists immensely proud. While teaching I learned so much about myself and how to behave with my miniature heroes and heroines who are living their lives so bravely being strong and soft at the same time. I admired "my kids". They taught me more than I could ever have imagined and I hope that I could give them something in return.

I would like to say thank you to all the people who made my year in India as beautiful and enriching as it was and who always gave me the courage to keep going and working in the name of Hope. Thanks for creating "my India" not only for one year but for my whole life. Khuda Hafiz! Apne mujhe bhut kuch diya.. (You have given me so much...)
